SUPREME COUNCIL, N.M.J. JURISDICTION NEWS BRIEFS

III.: Warren N. Barr, Sr., 33°, of the Valley of Chicago, has become the twenty-fourth recipient of the Northern Jurisdiction's highest award-the Gourgas Medal, named in honor of one of the founders of the Supreme Council in 1813 who is acknowledged as the "Conservator of Scottish Rite" during the difficult days of the nation's anti-Masonic period. The presentation was made on November 30 at Chicago by Sovereign Grand Commander Stanley F. Maxwell, 33°, Illinois Scottish Rite leaders and Chicago Valley officers and Supreme Council members. The citation accompanying the medal commended III.: Brother Barr particularly for his service over two decades as President of the Board of Trustees of the Illinois Masonic Medical Center, during the period of great growth for it and for other medical institutions and hospitals throughout the land....carrying out the expansion of the Leon M. Abbott Scottish RIte Scholarship program as authorized by the Supreme Council at its 1984 annual meeting. Explanatory folders and application forms will soon be available through the offices of Valley Secretaries throughout the N.M.J. The steady growth of the Education & Charity Fund, one of the Supreme Council Charities, makes possible an extension of this program to assist the children and grandchildren of Scottish RIte members as well as members of youth organizations affiliated with the Masonic Fraternity. It is hoped that the continued support of the Abbott Fund will allow future increases in the modest number of scholarships now available in the 15state area. The Double-Headed Eagle

The Double-Headed Eagle of Lagash is the oldest royal crest in the world. It was a symbol of power more than two thousand years before the building of King Solomon's Temple. No other heraldic bearing, no other emblematic device of today, can boast such antiquity.

That being so, how did it come into possession of the Scottish Rite? Why was it adopted as a symbol of the Rite, and by what authority do we use it? What is its significance?

The eagle was an ensign of the ancient kings of Persia. In Egypt and Greece, it was a bird sacred to the sun. It was an emblem of Jupiter, and with the Druids a symbol of the Supreme God. Marius, Consul of Rome in 102 B.C., ordained that the eagle should be the only designation as the ensign of the legions, and the single-headed eagle thereby became the emblem of the imperial power of Rome, and remained so ever after. After the division of the Roman Empire into the East and West, the Emperors of the West used a black eagle; those of the East a golden one.

The double-headed eagle first originated in the mighty Sumarian city of Lagash. From cylinders taken from the ruins of this ancient city the double eagle seems to have been known to the kings of that time as the Storm Bird. From the Sumarians this symbol passed to the men of Akhad; from them to the Hittites; from Asia Minor to the Seljukian Sultans, from whom it was brought to the Emperors of the East and West by the Crusaders.

The eagle of the Eastern Empire, united with that of the Western, typified the Holy Roman Empire when ancient Byzantine, or Constantinople, shared with Rome the honor of being the capital of the Empire. Charlemagne first made use of the double-headed eagle when he became head of the German Empire, by adding the second head, thereby denoting the union of Rome and German, in A.D. 802.



There seems to be some who believe that the double-headed eagle may have been a Masonic symbol as early as the beginning of the twelfth century, at the time of the second crusade, but it probably was first known to Free-masonry in 1758, upon the establishments of the Council of Emperors of the East and West, in Paris. This was a part of the Rite of Perfection, a rite of twenty-five degrees, from which was evolved, a large part of the present system of the Scottish Rite. The successors today of the Council of Emperors of the East and West are the Supreme Councils of the Thirty-third degree that have inherited the insignia of the double-headed eagle.

The double-headed eagle of Kadosh [Thirtieth, Thirty-first and Thirty-second degree] is a white and black eagle. The head, neck, legs and tips of the wings are white feathers, while the body and wings are black. Its wings are extended, yet drooping; in its claws is a naked sword, one talon of the right claw clutching the hilt of the steel blade of serpentine shape, the left claw grasping the blade. The white ribboned motto pendant from the hilt to the point of the sword contains the words "Spes Mea In Deo Est," in black.

The emblematic eagle of an Inspector General of the Thirty-third degree is similar to that of the Kadosh, except that gold takes the place of the white and the ducal coronet surmounts the head of the eagle, again supporting a small delta of gold, base downward, containing the initial letter "Jod." The fillet of the crown of an Honorary 33° is crimson, while that of an Active is purple. The crimson or purple ribboned motto pendant from the hilt of the sword to the point contains the words "Deus Meumque Jus."

It will be remembered that "all the Kings of the Earth sought the presence of Solomon to hear his wisdom that God had put in his heart."


"Man owes it to himself and to his brother to be his own best self," a precept if followed will never fail.


