








Perfect Knights of Rose Croix:

Dear Sublime Princes:

As I start to compose this, my final communication to you as your Commander-In-Chief, I am filled with mixed emotions on several accounts. I had the pleasure of bringing greetings from the Valley of Albany to the Valley of Schenectady, when I recently attended their Spring Reunion. I witnessed that grand historical degree, the 20th, sometimes known as the George Washington Degree. It was superbly conducted and certainly arouses ones sense of patriotism for this great land in which we are so fortunate to live. The Sigma Bodies are worthy of commendation for their organization, efficiency and performance of their degrees.

I want to thank all of you who extended expressions of sympathy to me and my family over the loss of my mother on March 26th. She was a brave and noble lady who was sharp right up to her passing at the wonderful age of 94 years and 7 months.

My feelings of mixed emotions comes about as I realize that my administration will come to a conclusion on the evening of May 17th, when we have the installation of our new officers. From the outset of my stewardship the resignation of our Valley Secretary, made it immediately necessary to secure a new Secretary, Later on, we had to secure both a new Custodian of the Works and a new Treasurer. I am happy to report that these things were done. We had successful attendance and participation at our Council of Deliberation held during both the last two years. We have had three successful classes at our Reunions and I am looking forward to one more successful class to be held on Saturday, May 4th.


