

ABOUT THE COVER

"The Signers of the Constitution of the United States"

Of the thirty-nine patriots who signed the Constitution, thirteen (twelve of whom are pictured on the front cover; no likeness of Jacob Broom is available) were definitely known to be Freemasons:

John Blair - Virginia David Brearley · New Jersey Jacob Broom - Delaware Daniel Carroll - Maryland Jonathan Dayton - New Jersey John Dickinson - Delaware Benjamin Franklin - Pennsylvania Nicholas Gilman - New Hampshire Rufus King - Massachusetts

Gunning Bedford, Jr. - Delaware

William Patterson - New Jersey
George Washington - Virginia

Seven of the remaining signers: William Blount - North Carolina; William Few - Georgia; William Samuel Johnson - Connecticut; John Langdon - New Hampshire; Robert Morris - Pennsylvania; George Read - Delaware; and Roger Sherman - Connecticut allegedly belonged to the Craft. However, their membership is the Fraternity is based on tradition or undocumented information, and therefore is not conclusively proved.

As for the remaining individuals - including Alexander Hamilton, William Livingston, James Madison, John Rutledge and James Wilson - no evidence of Masonic membership or activity had yet been found.

There were actually more than thirty-nine delegates to the Constitutional Convention which met on May 14, 1787 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and continued on eighty-seven days from May 25 to September 17, 1787.

Some delegates died during the several sessions, others resigned, and others were not re-elected. Fifty-five delegates had attended, but only forty-one stayed until the end and three of these refused to sign the document. Accordingly, the document, with thirty-eight deputies signing and one signature added later, was submitted to the Congress for consideration.

It took from September 20, 1787 until April 6, 1789 for the Constitution to be ratified and the first President and Vice President elected.

George Washington's inauguration in New York City on April 30, 1789, followed in due course, and the Government of the United States under the Constitution began actual operation.

The Sovereign Prince Speaks



I feel that we've had a good year and I am thankful for the opportunity to have served as Sovereign Prince. Our meetings were interesting...often filled with animated discussion about many topics not usually addressed in Lodge. These various discussions were often as provocative as interesting or informative. They were sometimes as controversial as

safe. But, in all cases, they helped those in attendance develop a deeper insight into the Craft.

Throughout the year I've advanced the premise that our future lies firmly entrenched in the practices of our past. In studying our history and contemplating that philosophy, one can either foresee the possibility of a resurgence of the Craft and its continuation as an organization that produces a viable benefit to society, or one can see us as an old, antiquated fraternity whose membership is declining and whose members have long lost the true purpose of its existence.

Our ancient, operative brethren founded an informal organization of small, instructional lodges where the secrets of stone building were communicated mouth to ear for both the perpetuation of the Craft and the improvement of its students. Through the ages the Craft lost most of its operative importance. But, men of wisdom and foresight preserved its basic tenets in a new system of formal symbolic lodges whose purpose was still to perpetuate itself and to teach new, worthy members. Membership grew, often in staggering proportions.

Contemporary Masonry, as it applies to us, is effected by these large numbers of modern members. It has created a massive infrastructure of buildings and organizations with monuments to men rather than to ideals. A large number of members are required to maintain this infrastructure so therefore the sheer number of new members are often more important to us than the quality thereof. To get these new members we often encourage application by minimizing the strictness of the Craft in diluting its historic requirements. The result of these actions is apparent. The new members then likewise minimize the Craft and the importance of personal involvement. If you don't think that is true just look at the sidelines in your Lodge. How many new members do you have? Of the new members, how many are regular attendees?

For our successful future we need an "Attitude Adjustment" to change our perspective. A hard look at the methods of our ancient brethren still appears to be the way to a successful future. Stricter membership criteria, more precise application of the tenets of our organization, and a deeper belief in ourselves will create a zealous core of successful Freemasons who will be the inspiration for a new generation.

Orders and Decrees; that I will hold allegiance and be loyal to the said Supreme Council as the Supreme Power of the said Rite within the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the United States; that I will hold as illegal and spurious every other Body of whatever degree claiming to be of the said Rite, that may be established within its Jurisdiction, that is not holden mediately or immediately under its authority and will hold communication whatever in Scottish Rite Freemasonry with any member of the same, nor allow him to visit any body of the said Rite of which I may be a member; and should I violate any part of this promise I consent to be expelled from Scottish Rite Freemasonry and to forfeit all my rights therein, and in any Body of the Rite, and be denounced to every body thereof in the world as a traitor and forsworn.

LESSONS OF THE SCOTTISH RITE DEGREES

The following in synopsis form is the official guide to the lessons taught to us in each of the Degrees of the Scottish Rite, known as the College of Masonry. It is your Editors hope that the readers of our newsletter will save, live by and distribute to brothers copies of the lessons described in this issue of our newsletter.

LODGE OF PERFECTION

- 4° Secret Master. The Fourth Degree emphasizes duty, fidelity, integrity, and the necessity for secrecy in all confidential relationships.
- 5° Perfect Master. This degree teaches that trust-worthiness is more precious than life and is the foundation of Masonic honor. Also, we must pay due respect to the memory of a deceased worthy Brother.
- 6° Intimate Secretary. This degree teaches that devotion to one's friends and zealousness in performing one's duties are rewarding virtues.
- 7° Provost and Judge. This degree teaches us to judge righteously, without respect to person, and that one law and one custom shall apply to all. Let justice be impartial, tempered with deserved mercy.
- 8° Intendant of the Building. This degree teaches that each new honor is meant to be a step toward perfection in the moral code; each a development of a particular duty; and that benevolence and charity are necessary virtues of leadership.
- 9° Master Elect of Nine. The lessons taught in this degree are that we should be careful not to be too zealous in executing justice, even in a good cause, and that we should avoid injuring or harming any person by hasty or irresponsible action.
- 10° Master Elect of Fifteen. The teachings of this degree are that ambition and jealousy can tempt men to evil deeds, that righteousness will eventually triumph over evil, and that evil doers will be punished.
- 11° Sublime Master Elected. This degree dwells on good citizenship. Evil doings should be punished. Honesty and respect for others should be rewarded. Be earnest, honest and sincere.
- 12° Grand Master Architect. This degree teaches that the Mason, as he learns to use the tools and instruments of his trade and skill, also learns to contemplate the many aspects of life and deal with them as a child of God, steadily advancing to those heights of experience which we call perfection.
- 13° Master of the Ninth Arch. This degree teaches that difficulties and dangers, however great, should not deter the true and faithful brother from progressing onward to perfection. It teaches the great truth that the finest things in life come only as the result of constant and often painful effort.
- 14° Grand Elect Mason. In the Scottish Rite, this degree is the summit of Ancient Craft Masonry. As the crowning degree of the Lodge of Perfection, its essence is the holiness of God and reverence for His Holy Name. God will not hold him guiltless that taketh His Name in vain.

COUNCIL OF PRINCES OF JERUSALEM

15° Knight of the East or Sword. This degree teaches the important lessons of loyalty to conviction and devotion to right.

16° Prince of Jerusalem. This degree teaches loyalty to truth and fidelity to duty.

CHAPTER OF ROSE CROIX

- 17° Knight of the East and West. The lessons of this degree are that loyalty to God is man's primary allegiance, and the temporal governments not founded upon God and His righteousness will inevitably fall.
- 18° Knight of the Rose Croix of H.R.D.M. The lessons taught in this degree are that man must have a new Temple in his heart where God is worshipped in spirit and in truth and that he must have a new law of love which all men everywhere may understand and practice. This degree affirms the broad principles of universality and tolerance.

CONSISTORY

- 19° Grand Pontiff. This degree proclaims the spiritual unity of all who believe in God and cherish the hope of immortality, no matter what religious leader they follow or what creed they profess. It is concerned primarily with the perennial conflict between light and darkness, good and evil, God and Satan.
- 20° Master and Vitam. This degree is a drama of the American spirit confronting the challenge of disloyalty and treason. Masonic principles and leadership are subjected to a crucial test. The degree demonstrates the Masonic condemnation of all who conspire against the security of the nation and the happiness of our people.
- 21° Patriarch Noachite. This degree teaches that Freemasonry is not a shield for evil doing and that justice is one of the chief supports of our fraternity.
- 22° Prince of Libanus. In this degree, the dignity of labor is demonstrated. It is no curse, but a privilege, for man to be allowed to earn his sustenance by work. Idleness, not labor, is disgraceful.
- 23° Chief of the Tabernacle. This degree teaches that impure thoughts and selfish, unworthy ambitions are corrupting and destructive, and that a man who forgets his duty to family, country, and God will be morally and spiritually destroyed.
- 24° Prince of the Tabernacle. This degree teaches that a mutual belief in one true, living God should bind men together in the service of humanity and in a worldwide brotherhood.
- 25° Knight of the Brazen Serpent. This degree teaches that there are desert

- stretches in every individual life in the history of every nation, with a resultant breakdown of discipline and loss of faith. This degree is a clarion call to faith—in ourselves, in each other, and in God.
- 26° Prince of Mercy. This degree teaches the quality of mercy; that it is a spirit of compassion and a tenderness of heart which dispose us to overlook injuries and to treat an offender better than he deserves.
- 27° Commander of the Temple. This degree teaches that Scottish Rite Freemasonry believes in the concept of a free church in a free state, each supreme in its own sphere, neither seeking to dominate the other, but cooperating for the common good.
- 28° Knight of the Sun. This degree using the symbolism of the tools and implements of architecture teaches that by building high moral character among its adherents, Freemasonry may advance man's determined quest for the achievement of unity and good will throughout the world.
- 29° Knight of St. Andrew: This degree emphasizes the Masonic teachings of equality and toleration. We are reminded that no one man, no one Church, no one religion, has a monopoly of truth; that while we must be true and faithful to our own convictions, we must respect the opinions of others.
- 30° Grand Elect Knight Kadosh. This degree sets forth the tests and ceremonies that symbolize the experiences we must undergo in the building of excellence in character.
- 31° Grand Inspector Inquistor Commander. This degree teaches that we should give every man the benefit of innocence and purity of intentions. He who would judge others must first judge himself.
- 32° Sublime Prince of the Royal Secret. This degree describes the victory of the spiritual over the human in man and the conquest of appetites and passions by moral sense and reason. The exemplar represents every Freemason eager to serve humanity but caught between self-interest and the call of duty. Duty often requires sacrifice, sometimes the supreme sacrifice.

THIRTY-THIRD DEGREE

The 33° is conferred upon those members of the 32° who have been outstanding in their contributions to Freemasonry, the Scottish Rite, or who have shown in their communities the leadership which marks them as men who exemplify in their daily lives the true meaning of the Brotherhood of man under the Fatherhood of God. It cannot be sought by application, but must be such a man as described above who has been selected by the Deputy of his state.

When Is A Man A Mason?

When he can look out over the river, the hills and the far horizon with a profound sense of his own littleness in the vast scheme of things, and yet have faith, hope, and courage - which is the root of every virtue.

When he knows that down in his heart every man is as noble, as vile, as divine, as diabolic, and as lonely as himself, and seeks to

know, and to love his fellow-man.

When he knows how to sympathize with men, even in their sinsknowing that each man fights a hard fight against many oddsand still believes in them when they do not believe in themselves.

When he has learned how to make friends and to keep them, and above all how to keep friends with himself.

When he loves flowers, can hunt the birds without a gun, and feels the thrill of an old forgotten joy when he hears the laugh of a little child.

When he can be happy and high-minded amid the meaner drudgeries of life.

When star-crowned trees, and the glint of sunlight on flowing waters, subdue him like the thought of one much loved and long dead.

When no voice of distress reaches his ears in vain, and no hand seeks his aid without response.

When he feels a social iniquity as a personal sin, and a human calamity as a private bereavement - sharing the guilt and sorrows of his fellows.

When he finds good in every faith that helps any man to lay hold of divine things and to see majestic meanings in life, whatever the name of that faith may be.

When he can look into a wayside puddle and see something beyond mud, and into the face of the most forlorn fellow-mortal and see something beyond sin.

When he knows how to pray, how to love, how to hope, how to meet defeat and not be defeated.

When he has learned how to give himself, to forgive others, and to live with thanksgiving.

When he has kept faith with himself, with his fellow-man, with his God; in his hand a sword for evil, in his heart a bit of song-glad to live, but not afraid to die!

Such a man has found the only real secret of Masonry, and the one which it is trying to give to all the world.
