



MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. The Dream Lives On

"When we let freedom ring, when we let it ring from every village and every hamlet, from every state and every city, we will be able to speed up that day when all of God's children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles. **Protestants** and Catholics, will be able to join hands and sina in the words of the old Megro spiritual, 'Free at last! Free at last! Thank God Almighty, we are free at last!""

Nearly twenty years ago the world reeled in shock when the youngest man ever to win the Nobel Peace Prize was assassinated. The Baptist minister, civil rights leader, renowned author, *Time* Magazine's 1963 "Man of the Year," and eloquent dreamer of dreams was dead. Only one national holiday honors a private citizen: Dr. Martin Luther King, a man with a dream. His great achievements will be honored this year on Monday, January 18.

Born on January 15, 1929, King rose to national prominence in 1955 when he led a bus boycott in Montgomery, Alabama, and inspired generations of black Americans to insist on being treated as first-class citizens. Through his leadership, a local protest over a moral issue was converted into a national crusade. He appealed to white Americans' consciences and sense of justice. In turn, there was political leverage on the country's leaders. As a result, black citizens reaped the benefits of better housing, better education, better jobs, enabling the descendants of slaves to finally have a fair chance to join in the American dream.

The man who preached and practiced nonviolence died a violent death. But he left a legacy that lives today. More than equal rights, King wanted to generate a sense of pride and dignity in black Americans. He wanted to plant the seeds of mutual trust in all of us. His dream—"That one day this Nation will rise up and live out the true meaning of its creed: 'We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal"—lives on in each of us.



CELEBRATION



George Washington, the "Father of Our Country," would have been crowned king if a group of patriots had had their way! Fortunately, Washington was appalled at the idea of a coronation. He favored a republican form of government.

Who was this man who refused to be king, and became the first of 40 presidents to serve our nation through our 200-year history?

Nearly a century after Washington's birth, a lanky country boy named Abraham Lincoln took a job as clerk in a general store in Illinois. There he witnessed the brutality of slaves being chained, whipped, and sold like cattle. Did this experience shape his political thinking and lead to his becoming our 16th President?

President's Day, the third Monday in February, falls between the birthdays of Washington and Lincoln, our tallest and most illustrious presidents—one the founder, the other the savior of our country. We pause this month to remember some details of their lives.

ABRAHAM LINCOLN, downed by an assassin's bullet on Good Friday in 1865, is best remembered for his impover-ished childhood, the "Gettysburg Address," and death by assassination. What happened during the course of these events is in many ways the story of our nation.

Lincoln was born in a remote Kentucky log cabin, February 12, 1809. Self-taught and ambitious, he never found success easily. He lost his first election in Illinois in the early 1830s. His grocery business went bankrupt shortly thereafter, because his partner drank heavily and Lincoln himself was preoccupied studying law.

Success came at last when he won a seat in the Illinois assembly in 1834. He became an attorney and rose to power within the Whig party. In 1836, he was ambivalent on the issue of slavery, feeling that it was unjust, but fearing that abolition would cause severe problems.

Lincoln was elected to the U.S. Congress in 1846. After his term, he returned to work as a circuit lawyer. Although he lost the senate election of 1858, his debates with Stephen A. Douglas during that summer brought him to national attention.

Two years later he became the Republican candidate for President and won, amid threats of rebellion from southern states. By the time he took the oath of office, Confederate armies were seizing federal forts in their states. His first term of office was consumed by the turmoil of the great Civil War.

Reconstruction began during his second term.
He and his wife, Mary, celebrated the end of the bitter war and the beginning of renewed hope for our nation by going to Ford's Theater that fateful night in 1865

GEORGE WASHINGTON, born February 22, 1732, was destined to become a military hero: At the age of 20 he joined the Virginia militia as a major. Later, he was elected to command five Virginia militia companies. He took an active part in the Second Continental Congress; John Adams nominated him to be commander in chief of its proposed army. His election was unanimous.

The war that followed was not nearly so harmonious. Washington's military exploits were thwarted by factionalism, lack of funds, chronic desertions, poorly trained troops, and unreliable intelligence. Truly, he commanded a ragtag army!

Although at times ready to give up, Washington persevered until he had healed the wounds of the new nation. Never a flawless hero, he faced countless challenges and brought dignity to the new post of president. He also shaped America's foreign policy for generations. Washington died quietly on December 14, 1799, counting his pulse with his last breaths.
