



At our last meeting for the program we put on a sketch, which all seemed to enjoy.



LIVING AND LEARNING

FTER making a minor mistake, a rueful man remarked, "I live, but I don't learn." Many of us suffer from the same debility. We go on making the same mistakes over and over again. We spend more than we earn, even though we ought to know we will have to pay the piper. We fly off the handle with our children when we know from experience we ought to keep our poise. We tell falsehoods despite the fact we are aware that sooner or later they will trip us.

Life is for learning and we do not need to stay the way we are. A mistake, however trivial, is a means of growth. A thoughtful man remarked, "A wise man never makes the same mistake twice." So, if we are wise we learn from our errors and achieve maturity by way of knowledge that comes from living and learning. To live without learning is to bumble through the days without gaining either wisdom or insight.

A quarrelsome college professor who lost his position before he was protected by tenure remarked, "My life has been a succession of absurdities." In faculty meetings he always managed to irritate and anger his colleagues. He constantly criticized his superiors and never learned the art of open discussion without rancor. His life, therefore, seemed "a succession of absurdities."

Years ago in our Colorado mountain home we used oil lamps for light. It was fascinating to watch the miller moths flying into the flame. Singed once, they persisted until they were consumed by the flame. They never seemed to learn and they died of the folly of living without learning.

Recently, enamored of permissiveness, we mistakenly assumed we could live without discipline. We tried to make it easy for our children to get through grade school, high school and college without learning much on the way. Test scores suggest that education without rigorous discipline goes nowhere. We are well on the way to creating a generation of illiterates.

We should have learned from our own experience that easy access to

degrees is profitless in the long run. What matters is what we know and how we use what we know. The young man who was graduated from his high school as valdictorian of his class discovered when he took college entrance examinations that he could not qualify for an accredited college. His teachers had made things too easy for him. We are beginning to be aware that education without discipline is beyond the realm of the possible.

In somewhat the same fashion we

made the mistake of thinking morals do not matter. With pornography rampant and the wholesale exploitation of sex, we have been behaving as if nothing in life were sacred and God had abdicated. We should have learned from history that there is nothing new under the sun. The ancients could have told us that the absence of ethical discipline adds up to ruin.

Some members of the United States Senate and House, who should have learned something from the past, have made a shambles of their careers on the assumption that ethical values are irrelevant. If they had learned anything from the panorama of history they would have avoided their pitiful mistakes.

Essentially, we learn in two ways: from our own experience or from the experience of the race. There are many things we do not need to learn the hard way through our own suffering, or through pain inflicted on others. Historians and philosophers, prophets and seers have charted the wisdom of the past for us and offered guide lines for us. By way of their wisdom we can avoid costly mistakes if we will.

The Ten Commandments and the Sermon on the Mount are valid for life, not because they were written or spoken by miracle or oracle, but rather because they represent the distilled wisdom of the ages. They suggest the ways of the wise and the spiritual and ethical discipline that enable us to grow in grace and knowledge, in competence and maturity of mind.
