



Pumpkin Soup

Don't think that pumpkins are only for jack-o-lanterns and pies! Try this interesting variation of an old favorite-it's sure to please family and friends

green onions, sliced 2 tbsp. margarine pureéd, canned pumpkin 2 cups

2 tbsp.

1/e tsp. turmeric 2 cups skim milk chicken broth chopped chives or flour 1/4 tsp. ground ginger

Sauté the onions in margarine, and stir in pumpkin. Blend the flour and spices with ½ cup milk. Stir into the pumpkin mixture.

Add remaining milk, and cook, stirring constantly, 5 to 10 minutes until thickened. Do not allow to boil. Mix in the broth and heat almost to boiling. (If the soup separates from overheating, whirl in a blender to restore consistency.) Serve hot, garnished with chives or parsley. Makes 2 quarts.





INDIANA TO HOST SUPREME COUNCIL SESSION

One of the country's oldest fraternal organizations will conduct its 179th Annual Meeting at Indianapolis from September 20-25 when more than 1,100 Thirty-third Degree Masons, accompanied by their wives, gather for the 1991 meeting of the Supreme Council of Scottish Rite Freemasonry for the Northern Jurisdiction, U.S.A. A total attendance of more than 2,300 is expected, coming primarily from the 15 northeastern and midwestern states comprising the 412,000-member Northern Jurisdiction.

The highlight of the 1991 Session will be the conferral of the 33° upon 152 Scottish Rite Masons of the 32° who were nominated and elected to receive this signal honor a year ago in Milwaukee. The 33° is awarded for "outstanding achievement in the Fraternity or for contributions to others reflecting credit on Freemasonry." The impressive ceremony will be held on Tuesday evening, September 24.

September 20-21 will be devoted to executive business sessions attended by the principal officers and Active Members who serve as Directors of the Supreme Council. Presiding will be Sovereign Grand Commander Francis G. Paul of Vestal, New York, who has headed the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction since 1985.

Large-scale functions open on Sunday afternoon, September 22, when the Indiana Convention Center cont'd. on next column

will be the scene of a traditional Supreme Council Vesper Service. The General Sessions of the Supreme Council will open on Monday morning, September 23, continuing Tuesday, September 24, and closing Wednesday forenoon, September 25.

In the course of these Supreme Council General Sessions, it is anticipated that prominent leaders from other Masonic organizations in the United States, Canada, Mexico, Europe, and South America will join Northern Jurisdiction members for report and discussion periods.

In the course of the Supreme Council General Session on Tuesday, September 24, Dr. Steven Matthysse of Sudbury, Mass., will speak to Supreme Council members on Scottish Rite's long-standing program of financing schizophrenia research projects in this country and abroad.

A number of other events have been planned by the Supreme Council including Sunday noon "Get Acquainted" luncheons for the new Supreme Council members and their ladies.

In addition to the official program events, there will be numerous social functions throughout the week under the auspices of the 15 participating states and the 110 Scottish Rite Valleys across the Northern Jurisdiction.

The 1991 meeting will conclude on Wednesday noon, September 25. At that time, there will be an announcement of the names of those chosen to receive the 33° at Chicago, in September, 1992.
