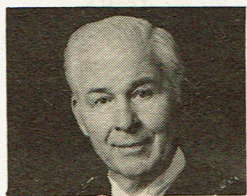

As you can see, we have a lot in store for you on this very special evening. I'm sure that you would not want to miss out on what promises to be an exciting event.

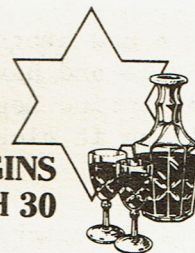
Please telephone your reservations early for dinner. And if you are unable to be at dinner, then by all means join us at 7 PM for the ceremony, which will not last more than one hour.

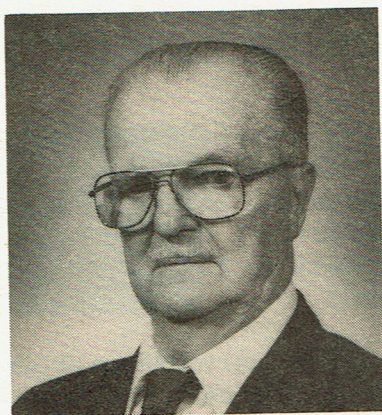

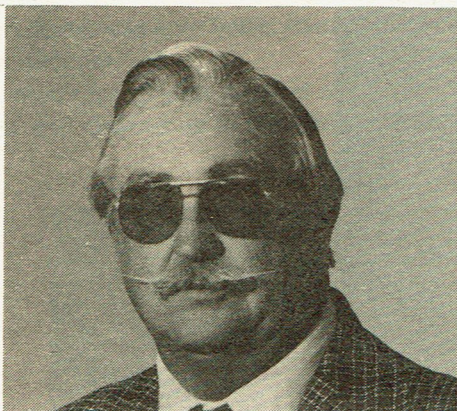
Let's all attend this impressive ceremony, honoring our departed Brethren.

Walker, Honorary Past Grand Master, Grand Secretary for the past 28 years, and a Grand Lodge staff member for nearly six decades.

M..W.. Brother Walker had been ill for the past several months, and was in the hospital at the time of his death. We are grateful that he did not suffer at the end.

Our dear Brother will be greatly missed by Freemasons everywhere but especially in New York. He served the Grand Lodge as Librarian and Curator for many years before beginning his service as Grand Secretary. Many of us knew him as a friend and confidante, a source of information about every conceivable Masonic subject, and a wise counselor. He was a prolific writer: a speaker who could cover any subject with a few short but pithy sentences, usually with a touch of dry humor; and a humble person who performed many quiet acts of personal charity.

While we grieve at this loss to the Masonic world, we are all the better for our association with him and for his dedicated and productive service to the Fraternity which meant so much to him.

He is survived by his sister, Kathleen (Mrs. Morris C. Flanders) of Battle Creek, Michigan and Lake Placid, Florida. He had lived alone in recent years, following the death of his beloved wife, Majorie in 1978.

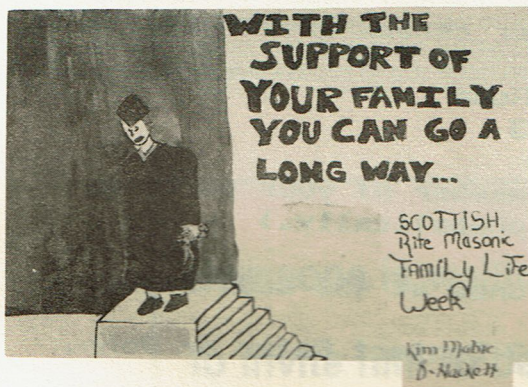
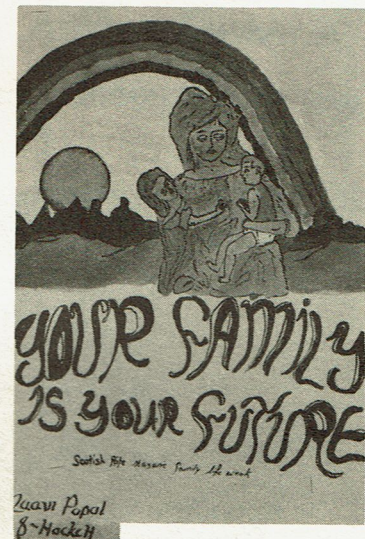
January 3 Sportsmen's Night

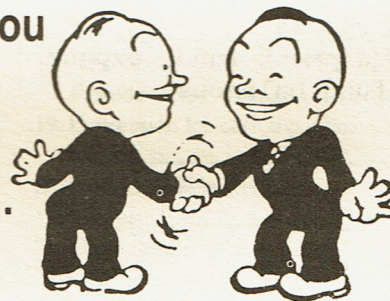

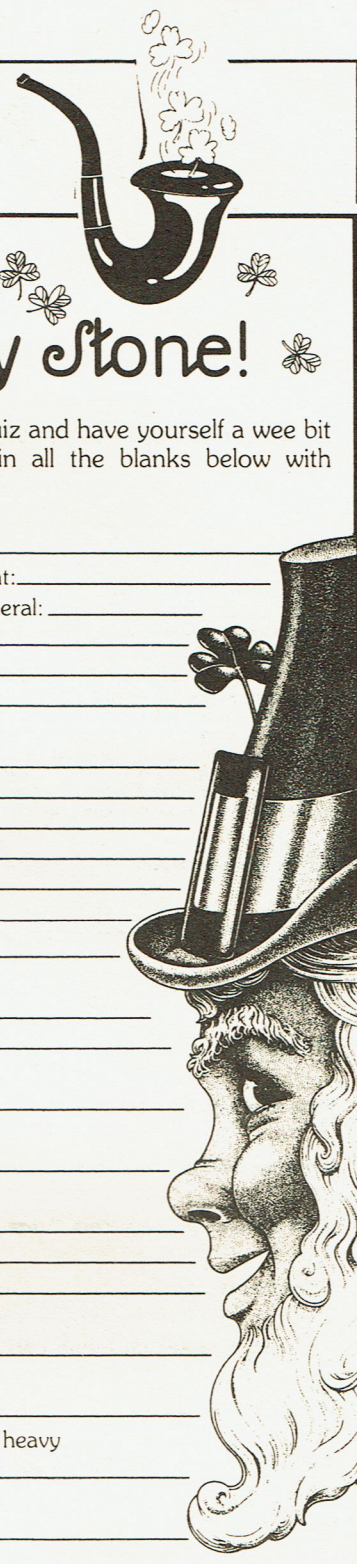

Feast of the Paschal Lamb

The Solemn Observance of the Feast of the Paschal Lamb is neither the Feast of the Passover nor the institution of the Sacrament of Holy Communion, although it commemorates both holy days.

The Jewish Feast of the Passover commemorates the escape of the Hebrews from Egypt, when God, smiting the firstborn of the Egyptians, passed over the houses of the Israelites. Thus the blood of the paschal lamb, which had been used to mark the houses of the Israelites, has symbolized redemption. For observance of this Feast, Jesus gathered his disciples in the night in which he was betrayed. In their midst he instituted the sacrament which Christians revere as The Last Supper.

Chapters of Rose Croix observe this beautiful and symbolic celebration of the Feast of the Paschal Lamb as a memorial service, honoring our brethren who have passed to their eternal reward during the preceding year. In spirit, we seem to sense their presence at the Mystic Banquet as we seek to strengthen the ties of brotherly love which bind our hearts in holy remembrance.
