

George Washington Tells Why He Became A Mason

"My first desire to become a Mason was due to the fact that many of Virginia's noblest sons were members of the Fraternity. Therefore, it was not without forethought that on Saturday evening, November 4, 1772, in the village of Fredericksburg, I was made an Entered Apprentice Mason.

"The Masonic lessons I learned on my admission to Masonry and my contact and conversation with prominent Masons thereafter were of the greatest encouragement in after years when I encountered and underwent severe trials, especially those of commencement and during the Revolution.

"It was at this time that friendly counsel reached my ears to the effect that some of the men regarded me as a slave owner and an aristocrat and they abhorred my Episcopacy. I decided at once to dispel such thoughts from my comrades' minds and on one occasion sat in a Masonic Lodge

at Cambridge of which an Orderly-Sergeant was Master. I made it a point o 'meet upon the level' and 'part upon the square' with all my comrades, regardless of rank or position and my reward was the loyalty and friendship of all far beyond my expectation.

"There is no doubt in my mind that Masonry and its lessons were helpful throughout the Revolution both upon the battlefield and in the Legislative assembly."

CONGRATULATIONS NEW RED HATS

At the recent Council of Deliberation held in Syracuse, New York, we were delighted to hear the announcement of three deserving individuals in the Valleys of Albany and Troy who are to receive the prestigious Meritorious Service Award in June of 1995 at the Council of Deliberation meeting in Melville, Long Island.

Those to receive their MSA are George J. Deveneau and Douglas C. Hays of the Valley of Albany; and Donald D. Seyboth of Delta Bodies, Troy.

George J. Deveneau was born in Albany, NY on February 8, 1914, the son of Milow and Mary Schmidt Deveneau.

Educated in the Albany Public School, he graduated from Albany High School in 1943. George also graduated from the New York City American Management School.

Brother Deveneau saw service in the U.S. Army in the China/Burma/India Theater of Operations during World War II. He is the widower of the former Mildred Van Alen Deveneau and the father of one son, George "Doc" Deveneau. He has one granddaughter, Michelle.

Presently residing in Loudonville, NY, he is a communicant of The Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. He retired from the New York State Thruway Authority in 1979 as Bureau Chief of Office and Building Services.

Brother Deveneau was raised in Mount Vernon Lodge No. 3 on February 14, 1944 and served as its Master three years. He was appointed District Deputy Grand Master of the Albany District by Most Worshipful Robert C. Singer, Grand Master, for the year 1986/87, and served as President of the Hudson Champlain Valley Right Worshipful Association.

Arthritis On The Rise

By the year 2020 arthritis will afflict nearly 20 percent of the population, up from 15 percent in 1993, predicts the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The dramatic increase will largely reflect the aging of the baby-boom generation, says Don Riggin, president of the Arthritis Foundation.

The name arthritis encompasses more than 100 different diseases marked by pain and swelling in joints and connective tissue. The two most prevalent forms are both chronic: osteoarthritis, in which the cartilage in the joint deteriorates and rheumatoid arthritis, an autoimmune disease in which immune system activity causes the joint lining to become inflamed and deteriorate.

Because the prevalence of arthritis increases rapidly after 45, the Arthritis Foundation recommends that those born before 1950 routinely check for initial symptoms. These include recurring pain or swelling in joints and stiffness or limited movement that lasts for more than two weeks. "Early treatment is essential if you hope to avoid future limits on your daily activities," says Riggin.

People with arthritis can reduce pain by regular exercise, applying hot or cold treatments (such as ice packs, ointments, heating pads and compresses) and protecting joints from stress.

The Ineffable & Sublime Grand Lodge of Perfection received its charter on December 20, 1767 from Henry Andrew Francken, Deputy Inspector General of all the Superior Degrees of Masons in the West Indies and North America.

The Chapter of Rose Croix was chartered in 1824.

In the late 1700's there were three Blue Lodges, a Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, a Commandery of Knights Templar and the Lodge of Perfection, AASR.

The Albany Temple will be celebrating its 100th Anniversary next year and we need your help to highlight the meaning of Masonry and our heritage that was felt when Albany was a "Masonic Town". A lot of good men has passed through these historical doors, including five Grand Masters, Mayor William Hackett and President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Times have changed and since the high point of membership in 1929, our numbers have been decreasing at a rapid rate. If it continues on this downward trend, by the year 2000, Masonry will be on display in a glass cage in the State Museum like the Indians of old. However, none of us should be included in the "Prophets of Doom" and speak of Masonry and Scottish Rite shortly becoming history. Your help is needed in getting that pendulum swinging the other way. New members are needed, and it is up to you to get those new folks to join our ranks. Masonry is alive and will continue to flourish. We still pay our bills and make necessary improvements in the temple. More importantly, our presence is felt in the community.

We are not moving and have no immediate intentions of moving. Neither are any of the other bodies in the temple planning to move now.

On Tuesday, September 27, 1994, Alan Clark Lewis, Commander-In-Chief of the Albany Sovereign Consistory from May 1991 to May 1993, will be coroneted an Honorary Member of the Supreme Council, 33°.

In recognition of Brother Lewis achieving this highest Honor in Scottish Rite Freemasonry, a testimonial dinner will be held in his behalf, Saturday, November 12, 1994, at the Holiday Inn Turf on Wolf Road, Colonie. Formal invitation can be found elsewhere in this issue of the Rite Light.

Brother Lewis was born on October 1, 1932 and attended the Berlin, New York public schools. He graduated from the Berlin Central School in 1950.

Alan is married to the former Shirley A. Haman. They have three daughters - Kim Reneé, Tracie Ann and Aimee Elisabeth.

Brother Lewis is a graduate of the State University of New York at Albany, having received his BS degree in 1957 and an MS degree in 1959, majoring in mathemetics and physics.

He spent three years in the U.S. Navy during the Korean Conflict and was honorably discharged in 1953 with the rank of Petty Officer Third Class.

Having spent time with the New York State Teachers Association, Brother Lewis has been Legislative Relations Goordinator for the New York State United Teachers since 1972, which position he now holds.

He is a member of the Delmar Methodist Church and served as its Director of Youth Fellowship in 1965.

Brother Lewis began his Masonic career in Van Rensselaer Lodge No. 400, F & AM in Hoosick, New York where he was raised a Master Mason on December 2, 1957. He served as its Master in 1963 and 1964 and as Secretary from 1967 to 1971.

Brother Lewis was appointed Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Alberta, Canada near the Grand Lodge of New York from 1969 to 1972. Over a period of time he has served on the Grand Lodge 1981 Bicentennial Committee; the Grand Lodge Education Committee; and the Grand Lodge Taxation Committee.

Brother Lewis affiliated with Bethlehem (now Onesquethau) Lodge No. 1096 in 1964 and has served as its Master in 1977 and 1983. He has been Secretary of this lodge since 1985.

Since 1958 Brother Lewis has kept himself very active in the Order of Eastern Star. He has been Patron in Berkshire Star No. 500 in 1959, 1961, 1963 and 1970; and also Patron in Onesquethau Chapter No. 223 in 1975 and 1988.

He served as Grand Marshal for the Order of Eastern Star, New York State, in 1960 and became Grand Patron, OES in 1978.

Amongst his many memberships, Brother Lewis is a Life Member of the Capital District Masonic (Charities) Association, serving as its Treasurer from 1980 to 1987.

He belongs to Temple Chapter No. 5, Royal Arch Masons and served as its High Priest in 1985.

Brother Lewis served as District Deputy Grand High Priest, 10th Capitular District, Royal Arch Masons from 1990 to 1992.

He is a member of the DeWitt Clinton Council No. 22, Cryptic Masons and Temple Commandery No. 2, Knights Templar in Albany, the Albany York Rite College No. 24,

Albany Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine and the Royal Order of Scotland.

He has been a member of the Valley of Albany Scottish Rite Bodies since November 1964. He has served as Sovereign Prince of the Grand Council of Princes of Jerusalem from 1982 to 1983 and as Commander-In-Chief of the Albany Sovereign Consistory from 1991 to 1993.

Our Deputy asks that the following guidelines be used by the Valley, until superseded by directives of the Supreme Council, AASR, Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

"It is NOT improper to wear your Scottish Rite cap at all Valley functions: in fact, you are encouraged to do so.

"The cap SHOULD BE REMOVED from your head during prayer, the Pledge of Allegiance, the National Anthem, altar preparations, and Obligations to Candidates. Hold the cap in your left hand at side, with arm extended downward.

"The SIGN OF FIDELITY should always be given during altar preparations, Obligations to Candidates, addressing Officers during tiled meetings, or Degrees, as well as during prayer in the LODGE room, but NOT in the Dining Room.

"The SIGN OF FIDELITY is also given during the OPENING and CLOSING DECLARATIONS, except in the Chapter of Rose Croix where the sign of the Good

Shepherd is used.

"The other exception is the PROPER SALUTE in the CONSISTORY which is the SIGN OF FIDELITY, FOLLOWED BY EXTENDING THE ARM FORWARD WITH PALM DOWN AND LOWERING TO YOUR SIDE, ALL IN ONE CONTINUING MOTION.

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CLEVELAND, OHIO SITE OF 182ND ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SUPREME COUNCIL, N.M.J.U.S.A.

An attendance of more than 2,200 made up of nearly 1,200 Thirty-third Degree Masons and their ladies are expected to visit Cleveland, Ohio, between September 23-28 as the Supreme Council for Scottish Rite Freemasonry for the 15-state Northern Jurisdiction

holds its 182nd Annual Meeting.

The Cleveland Supreme Council Session will be highlighted by the conferral of the organization's Thirty-third Degree upon 139 Scottish Rite Masons who were nominated and elected to receive this high honor at the 1993 meeting at Boston, Massachusetts. The Thirty-third Degree is awarded for outstanding achievement in the Fraternity or for significant contributions to others, reflecting credit on Freemasonry. The impressive ceremony will take place in Cleveland's Convention Center Music Hall on Tuesday evening, September 27.

Introductory luncheons honoring the Thirty-third Degree candidates and their ladies will be on the schedule for Sunday noon with the Men's event scheduled for the Grand Ballroom, Stouffer Tower City Plaza Hotel while the Ladies' Luncheon will be held in

the Ambassador Baliroom at Stouffer's.

Business conferences attended by the Active Members and officers of the Supreme Council will be

held September 23 and September 24.

The larger-scale events will begin on Sunday, September 25, when the Grand Ballroom of the Stouffer Tower will be the scene of the traditional Supreme Council Vesper Service. The Rev. Lewis W. Raymond, 33°, Pastor Emeritus of The Old Stone Presbyterian Church in Cleveland, will deliver the

Vesper message.

Sovereign Grand Commander, III.. Robert O. Ralston, 33° will preside over the General Sessions of the Supreme Council which will open on Monday, September 26, in the Cleveland Convention Center Music Hall.
