

## A Word From The Sovereign Prince

Valiant Princes: I am very honored to have been elected by you to serve as Sovereign Prince of the Grand Council of Princes of Jerusalem, Valley of Albany, for the ensuing year (1998-1999).

To acquaint those of you who may not know me, I was born on December 8, 1925, in Hackensack NJ. My father being with the Federal Government kept us moving about quite a bit. We lived in Louisiana, Oklahoma, California, Missouri, and Ohio before I entered service in 1943.

During World War II, I was a rifleman with the 397 <sup>th</sup> Infantry Regiment in France and Germany.

My Masonic career began in East Greenbush at Schodack Union (now Van Rensselaer) Lodge No. 87, where I was initiated Entered Apprentice on April 8, 1971. On February 14, 1995, 1 was honored to be awarded the Dedicated Service Award. I am also a member of St Mark's Lodge No. 94 in Port Stanley, Ontario, Canada. Aside from being active in Scottish Rite, I also belong to the Oriental Shriners in Troy, NY.

I hope you all had as enjoyable summer as I did. Two memorable events took place. The first was when I raised my son, John, in Phoenix Lodge No. 13, Colorado Springs, Colorado. They do things differently out there. Each of the five candidates received the degree individually. Can you imagine the Sr Deacon giving the Middle Chamber Lecture five times in one day?

My summer was again highlighted at the Council of Deliberation held in Liverpool NY, July 9-12. At Friday night's banquet, a young girl (about ten years old) who is a student at our 32 Masonic Children's Learning Center in Rochester, NY, along with her family, spoke of the frustrations previously experienced at home and in school, because of her inability to read. She had dyslexia, and was not doing well in school. However, after attending our Learning Center this past year, she can now read at a fifth grade level. Her mother said she has progressed very well and is much

better adjusted. Overcome by emotion, she thanked everyone in Scottish Rite for helping her daughter to lead a normal life.

We should all be very proud of our fraternity and Scottish Rite in particular for its endeavors in helping these kids. It is truly wonderful.

## Congratulations!

At its 129<sup>th</sup> Convocation in Liverpool, New York, the Council of Deliberation elected William Minor Korn, 32° and Ralph Earl Shaffer, 32°, to receive the prestigious Meritorious Service Award at its next meeting in Liverpool, July 1999..

William M Korn was born in Albany, New York, on August 22, 1946. Since 1950, he has lived in the Guilderland area. He gradu-

ated from Guilderland High School and received his BA from Central College, Pella, Iowa in 1969. Since college, he has been employed by Knolls Atomic Power Laboratory as a scientific computer programmer.

In 1972, Bill married his wife, Barbara. They have a daughter Sara, and a son, Matthew, both of whom are attending college. In 1974, Bill constructed the home the family lives in today.



Bill was raised in Noah Lodge No 754 on March 13, 1970, and served as its Master in 1976. He is a member of the Old 17<sup>th</sup> Past Master's Association, and currently is Secretary of his lodge.

In 1991 Bill received his 32° and has been a cast member of the 26<sup>th</sup> degree, since 1993. He is now Director of the 32<sup>nd</sup> Degree, and has an active part in the cast. Bill is currently Senior Warden (see Korn P10)

Ralph E Shaffer was born on September 18, 1920, in Cambrin County, Pennsylvania. In 1937, he graduated from Wilmore, Pennsylvania High School.

Before enlisting in the United States Marine Corps during World War II, Ralph was employed by several different electrical contractors, building power lines in the eastern part of the United States.

During the war, he saw action in the South Pacific, and was awarded the

Purple Heart Medal for wounds received during the campaign in Okinawa. He served six months in China before returning to the United States where he received an Honorable Discharge.

Ralph, again, went to work for the Port Chester Electric Company. During this time, he was sent to Troy, New York, where he met and married the former Doris Bonesteel. They celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary April 6, 1997,



and are the proud parents of two children and four grandchildren.

Brother Shaffer retired in 1983 from Niagara Mohawk Power Company after twenty-five years service.

Ralph attends the Center Brunswick United Methodist Church in Troy NY. He currently is a member of the Administration Council, where he has faithfully served for many years. He also has been a lay reader, and chairman of the Board of Trustees.

Brother Shaffer was raised to Master Mason on March 16, 1965, in Phoenix Lodge No 58, Lansingburg NY, and served as its Master in 1970. He received the Dedicated Service Award in January of 1989, and presently serves as a Trustee.
