

### Greetings from the Most Wise Master

Perfect Knights:

The above freezing temperatures we're experiencing give hope that Winter has finally passed and Spring is now upon us.



Palm Sunday, April 13, 2003, will usher in our traditional Solemn Ceremony of the Feast of the Paschal Lamb. This beautiful and symbolic public observance is celebrated each year in memory of our departed Brethren. All Perfect Knights are obligated to attend.

This Feast is neither the Feast of Passover nor the institutions of the Sacrement of Holy Communion, although it celebrates both holy days. The Passover was a festival instituted to commemorate Jehovah's "passing over" the Israelite houses while "passing through" those of the Egyptians in order to destroy the firstborn of each household. In the early history of these celebrations, a lamb without blemish was taken from the flock on the 10th and killed on the 14th day of the Hebrew month Abib, which occurred at the spring of the year. The blood of the lamb was to be sprinkled on the two side posts and the upper door post, and the flesh eaten with unleavened bread and bitter herbs before the morning. Jehovah, passing over the blood-stained doors, slew the firstborn in the Egyptian houses not similarly protected. St Paul likens the Paschal feast to the resurrection of Christ, but, no matter what the interpretation, in Masonry it has no creedal significance. To our Brethren of Rose Croix, it is known as the Mystic Banquet, and it is obligatory, at least in spirit, for every Knight Rose Croix, on this special day, to break bread with a Brother and partake of a portion or roasted lamb. This ceremony is but another method of bringing to our minds those great moral truths which we already have been taught. It is in that spirit that we assemble, as Masons and as Brethren.

The symbolic elements incorporated in the Mystic Banquet are *the Matzo*, or unleavened bread, symbolic of the bread which the Hebrews made when they hastily left Egypt, because they did not have enough time to allow their dough to leaven. *The Moror* or bitter herb (horseradish) is symbolic of the hardships which the Israelites endured when they were slaves in Egypt. *The Haroses* is a kind of paste of apples, almonds, raisins, and wine symbolic of the mortar the Israelites used

There are many Masons hoping that someone will ask them to receive MORE LIGHT

when they were slaves in the construction for the Pharaoh. *The Shank Bone* is symbolic of the Paschal Lamb that was sacrificed and eaten on the eve of the Passover. *The Hard-boiled Egg* is symbolic of life and springtime whemn nature renews life. And *the Cup of Wine* is commemorative of the promise made by God to Moses to redeem the Israelites by bringing them out of bondage.


It was for the observance of this Feast that Jesus of Nazareth gathered his disciples on the night on which he was betrayed by Judas Iscariot. He was in their midst when he instituted the sacrament which Christians revere as *The Last Supper*.



### POINTED IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION THE WISDOM OF OUR FRATERNITY

HAVE found it interesting that age is held in the highest regard in most countries other than the United States. Throughout the world, age and wisdom are interrelated. Across the globe and down through the ages, there is the belief that the young can learn invaluable lessons from their elders.

Unnecessary mistakes can be avoided, the most beneficial path can be followed, and the sacred continuity of one generation to another is unbroken. In other words, with age comes wisdom.

Only now in the United States are we beginning to recognize that the future is more secure if we look backward as well as forward, if we listen to voices other than our own.

Although a few have had their mentors in politics, business, the arts and education, we are now coming to appreciate and even celebrate the value of learning from those who walk before us.

All this, of course, is nothing new to Freemasons around the world.

It has long seemed to me that the wisdom of our Fraternity is one of its most significant gifts to our members, one that may not be fully appreciated by today's Masons.

There is an utter simplicity to Masonic wisdom. Perhaps this is the definition of wisdom: seeing life simply and clearly. Wisdom is the pane of glass that's so clean we do not even see it.

My idea of Masonic wisdom rests in our Fraternity's unique ability to help a man stay pointed in the right direction. Since we all make mistakes, there are those who urge us to learn from these errors. This is only partially true. We all know those who make one mistake after another and never seem to learn from what they're doing. They repeat – time after time – the same mistake. They never move forward.

There are others who are able to view what they have done against a standard of performance. They make the necessary adjustments and move forward. Have they learned from their mistake? Not really. They have actually learned to compare what they had done against a better standard.

The unique contribution of Masonic wisdom of a man's life is simply keeping him pointed in the right direction. He has a standard by which to measure his actions. He gets more out of life because he remains on the right path more than others.

Our Masonic symbol of the Square and Compasses is no accident. It serves a unique purpose. No matter how many times a Mason sees these tools, he cannot escape being reminded of how he is expected to live! This is the wisdom of our Fraternity.
