True friends are those who really know you but love you anyway.



Don't forget your favorite lady February 14 - Valentine's Day!




# Greetings from the Most Wise Master...

OR all those who are curious about Freemasonry, for those who are already Freemasons, and more especially, for those who are contemplating joining the Craft, this artical answers the question, 'What is Freemasonry?' with the more meaningful question, 'What is a Freemason?' In the answer to that question lies the essence of the Craft.

Freemasonry is not, as most popular books portray it, little more than a series of strange ceremonies, involving curious symbols and odd regalia; nor is it a museum of Masonic mementoes. Rather it is a living structure, built up from the aspirations and achievements of every individual Freemason during the 275 years that the Craft as we know it has existed.

Above all, Freemasonry consists of *Men*: men who have joined the Craft because its eternal principles strike a chord within them. When Masons are asked what the Craft means to them, not one of their answers will be exactly the same as another, but the essence of that meaning will never vary and it is epitomised in these words of Rev. Norman Vincent Peale – perhaps, one of the most distinguished of living American Masons. For Rev. Peale, membership in the Craft brought its own rewards in all aspects of daily life.

'The values and ideas, the profound principles of religion, morality and honour for which Masonry stands, mean much to me as an American...

There is, as I see it, nothing like Masonry. It is unique in its fellowship which spreads over much of the earth, in addition to our own country. Moreover, this in-depth fellowship spans the years, even the centuries, running back into antiquity. To me it means a personal relationship with great historical personalities and, taken by and large, also with about the finest body of men whom it is possible to assemble anywhere...

Attending Lodge and participating in Masonic activities gave me confidence. I learned to work with people. I found that everyone, every single brother, had a special talent. All I had to do was bring it out. The Brother, then, saw quickly enough how to put his talent to use. And his success at Lodge work gave him confidence too! He passed it on to others, and they to still others. It wasn't necessary to repeat a self-help motto like 'I believe in me.' Just doing the work and seeing the results were enough.

Confidence in self, in the Lodge, in Masonry, in the community and nation – it caught on, and I have seen it spread farther and farther as I continue my Masonic journey in life, meeting ever more Brothers and sharing with them the confidence Freemasonry can give...

Ever since I became a Mason, the work has not only charmed me, but also impressed me. I can further add that, as a public speaker, it has also given me enhanced perception of the nobility of words and their inspirational power when used in skillful combination and for the expression of lofty thoughts.'

their humility.

They must sign no Masonic document, without adding the characters that indicate their degree. When a Chapter is regularly established any where, it must of necessity meet six times a year, to wit:

On Holy (or Maundy) Thursday, On Easter Day, On the Thursday after Easter, On the day of Pentecost,

And on All-Saints' Day; besides meeting on the two feast-days of the Saint John.

A Chapter cannot consist of less than three members. When there are more, it has the same Officers as an ordinary Lodge; and the elections are held on the Thursday after Easter.

The Knights Rose Croix are bound to give charity to the poor, to visit those in prison and the sick, and to give them aid in their necessities, each according to his means.

The Knights cannot engage in mortal combat one with the other.

They cannot be excused for non-attendance at meetings of the Chapter, when notified, except in case of sickness.

Hmmm... Well, times do change. See you at our next conclave.

Remember our Special Scottish Rite class, April 26. Get that petition.

# The Commander-In-Chief's Message

As I write these remarks, the Fall Reunion has passed into history. The small class size - an historical "record"

- was disappointing, but the quality of the degree work showed the results of our renewed commitment to sustain and improve our ritual.



The first conferral of the revised Tenth Degree "Master Elect of Fifteen" went especially well, and the continuing efforts of our Thespian Reinforcement Chairman, Ill. William M Korn, 33\*, were also evident in the allegory for the 32 Degree, where many new cast members acquitted themselves in a fine manner. For the benefit of those who may not be familiar with the Tenth Degree, this degree takes place during the reign of King Solomon, at the time the Temple had been completed, and through the blessings of the Lord, Solomon was elevated to the highest worldly standing of any king. He was given wisdom, power, and riches beyond belief. Solomon had the promise of the Lord for forgiveness of sins; but his pride and vanity, and to some extent, his arrogance, forbade him from repenting and praying for forgiveness. This degree teaches that a violator of his obligations and commitments will not go unpunished and, further, that excuses, rationalizations, and other evidence of lack of repentance, will very likely increase the severity of the penalties.

Awards will range from \$500.00 to \$1,000.00 per academic year and are for one year only.

# "LESSONS FROM GEESE"



MASONIC LESSON: Lodge brothers who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going quicker and easier because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.

FACT 2: When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of flying alone. It quickly moves back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front of it.

MASONIC LESSON: If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those Headed where we want to go. We are willing to accept their help and give our help to them.

FACT 3: When the lead goose get tired, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies to the point position.

MASONIC LESSON: It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks and sharing other's skills, capabilities, and unique arrangements of gifts, talents, or resources.

FACT 4: The geese flying in formation honk to encourage those up front to keep up their effort.

MASONIC LESSON: We need to make sure our honking is encouraging. In groups where there is encouragement the production is much greater. The power of encouragement is a quality all should seek.

FACT 5: When a goose gets sick, wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down to help and protect it. They stay with it until it dies or is able to fly again. Then, they launch out with another formation or catch up with the flock.


# Letters from Presidents January 24 through June 23, 2003 Autographs from the G. Edward Elwell, Jr., Collection

The Van Gorden-Williams Library will present "Letters from Presidents," an exhibition of personal and official autographs from the Archives' G. Edward Elwell, Jr., Collection. The exhibition comprises 14 historic signed documents from George Washington, Andrew Jackson, Abraham Lincoln, and John F. Kennedy, to name a few. The presidential letters include older handwritten examples from the early presidents such as James Monroe and James K. Polk, as well as more recent typewritten, but individually signed letters. Several of the 20th-century letters were written directly to Mr. Elwell, including one from Herbert Hoover that addresses Elwell as a friend. The text of

several letters have a deeper research value such as the 1959 letter from then-Senator Kennedy, which discusses publicizing the future missile and space programs in the United States. Accompanying the documents will be biographical and his-

torical information as well as illustrated books with featured portraits and other visuals.
