arting Thoughts From the Commander-in-Chief – Spring 2005

Winter is upon us as I write this message – my last as Commander-in-Chief. The two years which started for me in May 2003 have come and gone very quickly. The changes to our Valley of Albany have been startling in that time. Old faces have left us behind and new ones are coming in to take their places. Each Brother who comes and assumes some part of the overall responsibility for this venerable organization enriches it as have those who have come and gone before us.

We have had our share of challenges here in the Valley, and they continue on. We continue to face the ongoing work of developing a program that will involve our membership as it should. This has been made more difficult by some communications issues which we are hopefully in process of solving at this point. I could and should write a column entitled "Did you know?" about the Valley of Albany, because there are a lot of things we have not communicated well, validating the asking of another question, "How come I didn't know?"

Did you know we had a Fall Reunion on October 16, in which six Scottish Rite Degrees were conferred by very good casts? Our small but enthusiastic class enjoyed the day, as did several visiting Brothers from other Valleys. Did you know that we conferred the Sixth Degree for the first time, as we did the Tenth Degree the time before?

Did you know that the Consistory worked through the 23rd Degree, otherwise known as the "Four Chaplains" Degree? I was privileged to witness this Degree at a State Council of Deliberation Meeting, and it is becoming one of the most popular Degrees, although it has never been portrayed in our Valley in its present form. It carries a message of unselfishness and devotion to one's Brothers.

Did you know that on September 22, the Valley of Albany was proud to present the Red Hat, the symbol of the Meritorious Service Award, to Brother Ronald H. Noll, 32nd Degree MSA. This presentation was made at the Awards Night Ceremony of Wadsworth Lodge #417, F&AM, marking the first time that a Scottish Rite award was presented as part of a Symbolic Lodge communication. The family of Masonry was well represented that evening.

Did you know that on Sunday, October 17, 2004, the Valleys of Albany, Schenectady, and Troy united to host an event which none of us had ever tried before. The "Capital District Walk for Dyslexia" was held at the Saratoga Battlefield to promote and raise funds for our 32nd Degree Masonic Learning Centers for Children. This has become our best-known charitable endeavor and will continue to be our focus for many years to come. Currently, New York has a functioning Learning Center in Rochester and another coming to fruition at the Eastern Star Home in Oriskany. These centers work with dyslexic children to attempt to eliminate this most disabling (and also far too common) learning disability. The cost per child is approximately \$5000. Our initial effort raised over \$3100 for this charitable work.

Did you know that the Valley of Albany has a beautiful and award-winning Web Site showing off not only our Valley, but also featuring the still-stunning Albany Masonic Temple? Brother Bob Fickies, our Thrice Potent Master, has done a marvelous job building and adding to this informative web site. He will describe it further in his article in this issue.

The main events for the Spring term include of course the **Spring Reunion**, now scheduled for **April 9th**, 2005. This reunion will feature some changes to our procedures mandated by the Supreme Council. These include the introduction of a new mandatory Fourth Degree, and the splitting of the time-honored 32nd Degree into two Degrees, the 31st and the 32nd, and other changes. Nothing would make me happier than to see a large and involved class witness these Degrees. Please say "yes" when the Degree Directors contact you for assistance.

As always, the Valley needs YOU. The small and dedicated core of Brothers working month in and month out are not going anywhere, but we need to see more old and new faces at our programs. That single-handedly makes our efforts seem worthwhile.

Hope to see you soon at a Valley program.

You'll also find a meeting schedule, and information for those men wanting to become a Mason, or join Scottish Rite. Our web site is also designed to serve as general starting point for all those seeking "more light in Masonry." There are dozens of links to other Masonic sites worldwide, and more are added regularly.

I am very pleased to announce that our web site has recently been certified by *Pietre-Stones Review of Freemasonry* as an "Educational Masonic Site. I invite all my brothers to visit our web site, and make your visit known, by signing our guest book.

I feel extremely honored to be chosen as presiding officer for the *Ineffable & Sublime Grand Lodge of Perfection*, which began its 237th consecutive year in October, as the very first Scottish Rite lodge to be chartered in all of North America. I plan to celebrate the Lodge's unique role as the birthplace of Scottish Rite Masonry in North America this year.

At the opening meeting of our Lodge of Perfection, we welcomed Dr. Stefan Bielinski, director of the Historic Albany program at the *New York State Museum*. Dr. Bielinski has collected a great deal of information on the citizens of Albany at the time when our lodges were founded. His presentation was just excellent, introducing the few brothers in attendance to several of our founding members, and the way they lived their daily lives in colonial Albany.

I would be remiss, if I did not tell you that I, and most of your valley officers, am concerned about the future of our concordant bodies. Most meetings are attended by less than one percent of the valley membership. Those attending are, for the most part, your presiding officers, and other members of the executive board. Hardly any fresh faces come forward to say, "I'll fill a chair", or even, "I'll make it a point to attend a couple of meetings this year". To those who do, I extend a sincere "Thank You, Brother!"

Our Sovereign Grand Commander, Walter E. Webber, 33 recently wrote;

"When the individual member builds a life that resembles a firm foundation stone, our fraternity is strengthened, but more importantly, the community in which he lives is enriched. Report From the Secretary

We completed the first full year with a whole new Administration in August 2004, starting with your Secretary, Treasurer, and Rite Light Editor. It has been a learning experience with a few small bumps in the road, but overall we have come through it pretty well. Many cost cutting measures were taken to reduce expenses, including significant cuts in administration, equipment, and utilities.

The heads of our four bodies worked to present interesting programs to the assembled members. Attendance was disappointing and in some instances, meetings were cancelled due to insufficient numbers in attendance. Your Executive Board has taken steps to address this situation. First, few meetings are being held on a Thursday, the night some Blue Lodges in the Albany District meet, but are being held instead on a Wednesday night. Second, several meetings have been eliminated by combining meetings of two bodies. I call to your attention the schedule of meetings and programs that was mailed to all members in September. Please post it conspicuously for future reference and plan to support your Scottish Rite body. One change worth noting: The Spring Reunion will be held on April 9, 2005.

I will highlight a few cost saving measures we have instituted. We reduced the printing of the Rite Light to bi-annually, reducing printing and postage expenses. In order to partially compensate for the reduced frequency of communication, we will be sharing more information electronically through e-mail. Please let the Secretary know your e-mail address so that you can be included in the electronic distributions. His address is mdderry@yahoo.com. Be assured that no e-mail addresses will be divulged to unauthorized persons and they will be used exclusively for Scottish Rite business.

In other cost cutting measures, we returned the copier and terminated the maintenance agreement. We terminated the contract on the postage meter and DSL phone line, also saving a substantial sum.

There were some successes during the year. The Feast of the Pascal Lamb was performed very proficiently by all participants from memory. We had a good Spring Reunion with six new members and the degrees were performed smoothly but with a few short notice replacements in the casts. We had an equally good Fall Reunion on October 23, 2004 with eight new members, when we performed the 6th, 14th, 16th (Delta Bodies of Troy), 18th, 26th, and 32nd degrees. We did the 6th degree for the first time and we will be performing the 4th degree for the first time in the future, a new Supreme Council mandate.

We have a few new officers joining our ranks this year. John Scott was been appointed Orator and Dennis DeBell was appointed Master of Ceremonies in the Chapter of Rose Croix. John Minozzi was elected to the office of Junior Warden in the Lodge of Perfection and Donald H. Blake was appointed Hospitaler. We welcome them to our ranks.

Important Dues Notice

At the 2004 Annual Convocation of the New York State Council on Deliberation several items of business were approved that will impact New York Valleys in the future. One of the most significant item concerns dues as follows:

Effective with the 2006 fiscal year, when a member of a Subordinate Body owes one year's dues, such Body shall take appropriate action within the next year ensuing. Such action shall be remission of dues or suspension for non-payment thereof.

We currently allow a member to get behind three years in dues. After August 1, 2005, we will take action to suspend any member who has not paid 2005 dues, since the 2006 fiscal year will have begun on August 1, 2005.

Please don't get behind in your dues payments and then become suspended for non-payment. Your Valley pays your assessments to the Supreme Council and the NYS Council on Deliberation each year that you are a member. That sum is significant.

Each year that you don't pay your dues costs your Valley in assessments. If you become suspended, you will have run up a debt for your Valley that will never be collected! While we don't want to lose you as a member, it is better that you request a demit while you are paid up on our books if you no longer wish to retain your membership.

When you received your 2005 dues notice, you received your dues card in anticipation of your payment of dues. Possession of a 2005 dues card is not evidence of payment of 2005 dues. Only a cancelled check or cash receipt issued by the Secretary is your proof of payment.
